"Some of the bands just had really good showmanship, especially Lost Intentions and Axis," said Mr. Picone. "The lead singer of Lost Intentions was great as an all-around performer."

ludging the musical abilities of the battling bands were Lavallette Councilwoman Anita Zalom, local Ricky Gettis, who went to school in Los Angeles for music production, and Ali Gleason from Metro Music in Wall Township. Metro Music is a recording studio that sponsored the competition and provided the first-place prize.

Local organizations and businesses were also involved in Saturday's concert, according to Ms. Schneider.

Lavallette The Department Ladies Auxiliary set up a tent where they sold food during the concert, and Lenny's Pizza in Lavallette donated water, soda and ice. The Borough of Lavallette allowed the Upper Shores Branch to use its outdoor stage and a drum set, which Ms. Schneider said helped, because "each band didn't have to drag their own around."
